our organization.



ABCP EXECUTIVE COUNCIL MEETING

The Fourteenth Meeting of the Asian Buddhists Conference for Peace (ABCP) was held in Ho Chi Minh City, Vietnam on October 7-8, 2023.

The Executive Council regular meeting was organized and hosted by the Vietnam ABCP National Center under the National Vietnam Buddhist Sangha.


It was attended by Most Ven. Kh. Byambajav, Secretary General of ABCP, members of Executive Council from Bangladesh (two National Centers - Boudha Kriti Prachar Sangha and Center II), Cambodia, India, Korea (Taego Order), Lao People's Democratic Republic, Mongolia (two centers of Dashichoiling and Gandan Tegchenling monasteries), Nepal, Russian Federation (two national centers - Ivolginsky and Aginsky Datsan), Sri Lanka (two centers - Wipulasara and Sumanatissa Chapters) and Vietnam (National Vietnam Buddha Sangha and Vietnam Buddhist University).

Most Ven. Thich Thien Nhon, President of the National Vietnam Buddha Sangha, made welcome remarks followed by remarks by ABCP Secretary General Most Ven. Da Lama Kh. Byambajav. The Executive Council meeting declared His Eminence, Most Ven. Thich Thien Nhon as the Permanent Patron of ABCP, who is one of the six patrons of ABCP.

The 14th Executive Council Meeting heard and discussed the activity report of the ABCP Headquarters, presented by the ABCP Secretary General, who spelled out the work done as a follow up to the decisions of the

12th and 13th Executive Council meetings. He expressed gratitude to the Indian National Center of ABCP for its initiative to take the responsibility for financing the Director of the ABCP Regional Coordination Center, which ABCP is planning to set up in the holy city of Bodh Gaya in Bihar, India. The Secretary General reported on the status of upgrading the roster status of ABCP with ECOSOC (UN Economic and Social Council) and called on the National Centers to engage actively with their re-

spective governments to support ABCP in this respect through their Permanent Representatives in the United Nations.

The Secretary General dwelt at length on the various activities carried out by the ABCP Headquarters in Ulaanbaatar in collaboration with the Mongolia National Center of ABCP - Gandan Tegchenling Monastery, and he also appreciated the work done in this regard by the National Centers of India, Nepal, Sri Lanka and Vietnam.

Most Ven. Geshe Jangchub

Choeden, Vice President of ABCP and the Indian National Center of ABCP, in reaction to the report of the Secretary General, expressed concern over the global situation, which is posing threat to peace and security the world over, and called on the Executive Council members to voice their concern over the existing global challenges and urged ABCP to work harder for peace. In this connection, the Vietnam and Japan National Centers of ABCP shared draft resolutions on promoting peace and ending armed conflicts in different parts of the world through peace talks and negotiations with due consideration of Lord Buddha's teachings of compassion, non-violence and respect for human values.

The ABCP financial report for the Fiscal years 2020 to the first half of 2023 was also presented at the Executive Council meeting. The Headquarters of ABCP appealed to the member National Centers to make their membership fees on time, upon which the activity and growth of the organization depended. From the floor, there were several proposals and suggestions concerning membership fees as well as contribution to the organization's Corpus Fund. (Before this issue was being prepared, National Centers of Nepal and Central Tibetan Administration in Dharamsala, and India contributed their membership fees, for which the ABCP Headquarters expresses its appreciation).

Mr. Sonam Wangchuk, Secretary of the Indian National Center and Deputy Secretary General of ABCP briefed the participants in the meeting on the preparations for the next 12th general Assembly of ABCP, which, he said, would be hosted by the Indian National Center.

The 14th Meeting of the Executive Council of ABCP con-

cluded with the discussion and adoption of a Resolution and a Communique.

During the two-days of the Council Meeting, Executive the Vietnam National Center -Vietnam Buddhist University, introduced the meeting participants with more than 1,000 residential monastic students of the University, organized meetings with and courtesy calls on His Eminence Thich Tri Quang, Sangharaja of Vietnam Buddhist Sangha, His Eminence Thich Minh Chau, former Deputy Sangharaja of Vietnam Buddhist Sangha and Chairman of Vietnam ABCP National Center, Ho Chi Minh City People's Committee and also organized visits to the National Vietnam Temple and the Quoc An Khai Tuong Temple in Dong Nai province.

EYES ON ABCP'S FUTURE

There is seemingly a growing tendency among the younger generation to ignore the values of national culture and traditions, as a consequence of which, there is an apparent risk of less social spiritual coherence, fragility of credo and belief, moral and ethical crisis, and further division of the society, owing to many factors related to globalization. Alien cultural influences are impacting traditional customs and rites, such as giving name to a newborn baby, clip-

ping the hair of a growing child, celebrating an important birth anniversary, customary funeral rites etc., posing a threat to customary rites and rituals.

Taking into consideration some of these negative trends, the Gandan Tegchenling Monastery, the Center of Mongolian Buddhists considers it imperative to better protect and preserve the values of traditional religion and culture, enlighten the society, strengthen moral and ethical values. Guided by the

strong belief that there is a need in the society today to preserve and hand over to the future generation the traditional values and practices, the Gandan Tegchenling Monastery has taken the initiative to build a center of religious and cultural tradition of the Mongols.

Globally, religious tourism is increasing. According to statistics (World Tourism Organization, a specialized UN agency), revenues generated from religious tourism in 2019, prior to

the COVID 19 pandemic, was 300 million US dollars, which today has grown to 18 billion US dollars.

The Gandan Tegchenling Monastery believes that the growth of the national economy can be supported by way of attracting the flow of international tourists to Mongolia especially through religious tourism.

Proceeding from this premise, the Center of Mongolian Buddhists has launched the project.

Apart from the above, some of the key goals of the project is to concentrate the activities of the Asian Buddhists Conference for Peace at the project center, energize the activities of this international religious organization and on this basis, increase the contribution of Mongolia to the cause of establishing peace in the region and in the world, as a whole.

The other objective of the project is to bolster the independence of Buddhist religion in the country, and for this purpose, set up a palace of Bogd Jebzundamba, the head of the Mongolian Buddhists.

The project area covers 15 hectares of land and is located at a place called Yarmag in the south western part of the capital city in the vicinity of the Bogd Uul mountain, a more than 360-year-old national protected park.

As of today, a 19-meter-tall statue of standing Buddha has been erected and consecrated. A meditation center is going to become functional soon and plans are afoot to build several construction projects, important elements of the center, such as a temple of Goddess Tara.

The project initiators and implementers have the slightest doubt that the center of religious and cultural tradition of the Mongols in Ulaanbaatar will become one of the must-visit-places for tourists and believers in the near future.






Leadership Transition at Gandan Tegchenling Monastery

In a momentous event, Gandan Tegchenling Monastery, the Center of Mongolian Buddhists, recently underwent a historical leadership transition. The Most Venerable GabjiuChoijamts Demberel, the 29th Abbot Khambo Nomun Khan of Gandan Tegchenling Monastery, and the President of the ABCP, resigned after an impressive 32 years of unwavering service. Fol-

lowing this remarkable tenure, a new era begins with the appointment of the 30th Abbot Khambo Nomun Khan, Geshe Lharampa Javzandorj Dulamragchaa.

Born on April 25, 1980, in Baruun Urt city, Sukhbaatar province, to father Dulamragchaa and mother Nanzad, Javzandorj Dulamragchaa emerged as the second child in the family. His spiritual journey

began at Erdenemandal Monastery in 1991, laying the foundation for a life dedicated to profound learning and unwavering commitment.

Javzandorj Dulamragchaa's spiritual journey is marked by significant milestones. From receiving the "Basic Precepts" from Damdinsuren Tumur, the 28th Abbot of Gandan Tegchenling Monastery, to the "Shramanera

Precepts" from Lama Luvsandamba of Drepung Gomang Monastery, and culminating in the "Bhikshu" ordination bestowed by His Holiness XIV Dalai Lama—an epochal moment in his spiritual evolution.

His journey of learning extended to Drepung Gomang Monastery in India, where between 2000 and 2012, he earned titles in Pramanavartika, Paramita, Madhyamaka, Abhidharma, and Vinaya. Notably, in 2017, he achieved the prestigious title of Lharampa, the highest academic degree in Buddhist philosophy, setting a standard of excellence. In 2018, he completed a one-year training at Gyuto Tantric Monastery, securing the first place in the secret tantra exam and the third place in the 2019 agrampa exam. Demonstrating unwavering commitment, he successfully completed the three-year secret tantric program at Drepung Gomang Monastery in 2023, earning top honors in debate, essay writing, and overall results, marking the initiation of his mission to disseminate the teachings of secret tantra.

Geshe Lharampa Javzandorj's impact extends beyond the academic realm. Since 2002, he has been teaching dharma to students from Mongolia and abroad, earning the title of "Mongol Bagshi or Teacher" among devotees and disciples in India, Tibet, and Mongolia. Notable among his disciples are prominent lamas like Yeguzur Khutugtu - Danzanluvsanvanjil Rinpoche, Sraidori Nomun Khan - Luvsandanbiijantsan Rinpoche, and Erdene Bishrelt Mergen Pandita - Danzanjamiyanlodon Rinpoche.

Returning to Mongolia, he played a pivotal role in community-oriented Buddhist teachings, meditation, training, cognition, and humani-

tarianism. His influence led to the establishment of the Sumadi Girdi NGO in 2013, dedicated to enlightening sentient beings.

His commitment to spreading the Dharma was further evident in his role as an interpreter during His Holiness the Fourteenth Dalai Lama's teachings, including the "Initiation of the Wheel of Time" in 2012 and the "Great Lamrim Chenmo" in 2013 and 2014, as well as during the His

tradition

Holiness the Dalai Lama's official visit to Mongolia in 2016.

Since 2011, Geshe Lharampa has held the office of the chief abbot of Erdenemandal Monastery, the Center of Sukhbaatar Province Buddhists, overseeing religious affairs, training personnel, and providing teachings to the public across the provinces, monasteries, and dharma societies. His influence extends globally, as he persistently contributes to spreading the Dharma in regions where Buddhism was less prevalent or had experienced decline, reaching overseas countries such as Japan, Austria, Belgium, and Germany.

A prolific author and translator, Geshe Lharampa has undertaken the translation and publication of significant works, including "A Necklace for the Fortunate" and Lama Jonondagwashudev's commentary on the "Three Main Points of the Path". His publications also include booklets in Mongolian and Tibetan, such as "Compendium of Lamrim," "Guide to Refuge," "Understanding Karma," "The Benefits of Dharma," "Ashisthana Supplication of Bodhicitta's Training," "The Purification of Altan Ovoo," "The Ritual of Local People 'Ongon Soum," "An Introduction to the Meaning of Emptiness," "An Introduction to the Nirvana Path of the Abhidharma Commentary," and "Prayers for the Exalted Ones."

Since 2020, at Zanabazar's Buddhist University of Gandan Tegchenling Monastery, the Center of Mongolian Buddhists, he has been teaching day and evening class students in interpretation programs for the "Lamrim", having taught over 600 students, he persists in disseminating the illuminating teachings of the Dharma in all directions.

In a momentous decree by the 29th Abbot Choijamts Dem-

PEACE EFFORTS OF THE LATE KHAMBO KHARKHUUGIIN GAADAN

¬ abju S. Gombojav, the Khambo Lama of Gandan Tegchenling Monastery, Center of Mongolian Buddhists, invited Buddhist monks from Sri Lanka, Nepal, India and Russia (former USSR) and met them in Ulaanbaatar on December 5, 1960. United under a common desire to promote cooperation among Asian Buddhists to establish peace in Asia, basing on the teachings of Lord Buddha on compassion, unity and harmony, the first meeting of the Asian Buddhists was organized on 11-13 June 1970 in Ulaanbaatar founding the Asian Buddhists Conference for Peace under the appeal "May those who fight with arms in hands, meet with flowers."

The Second President of ABCP, and Khambo of Gandan Tegchenling Monastery, the Center of Mongolian Buddhists Kh. Gaadan in his memoirs had written that Asian Buddhists in commemoration of the 2,500th birth anniversary of Lord Buddha, which was observed in the 1960s, were engaged in promoting the Lord Buddha's teachings on compassion, which became the fountain source of establishing the Asian Buddhists Conference for Peace (ABCP).

ABCP's first President S. Gombojav was an outstanding peace champion who made every effort to expand and strengthen the ranks of the organization, stop wars and aggressions in Asia, step up the involvement of the regional Buddhists in this struggle, ban weap-

ons of mass destruction and promote universal disarmament.

Khambo of Gandan Tegchenling Monastery, the Center of Mongolian Buddhists and President of ABCP S. Gombojav passed away in 1980 and on 10 June 1981 Kh. Gaadan was appointed the Khambo of the Gandan Tegchenling Monastery. One year later on 16-18 August 1981, the 6th General Conference of ABCP was held successfully in Ulaanbaatar thanks to the unfailing effort of Khambo Kh. Gaadan, who then spearheaded the Organizing Committee of the 6th ABCP General Conference, where he was unanimously elected as the President of ABCP.

Kh. Gaadan, ABCP President and Khambo of the Gandan Tegchenling Monastery, the Center of Mongolian Buddhists,

supported and contributed in every way the activities of ABCP. After the 6th ABCP General Conference, Khambo Kh. Gaadan established close contact with all the important Buddhists leaders in Asia, and took an active part in the peace efforts in the continent. In his capacity as ABCP President, Kh. Gaadan went on several peace tours to Nepal, Bangladesh, Bhutan, Vietnam, Cambodia, Laos, India, former Soviet Union, Sri Lanka, and Japan, where he met with the leaders of the ABCP National Centers and held business-like consultations with them.

ABCP President Kh. Gaadan in his speeches and remarks, made at ABCP leader's and Executive Council meetings and round-table conferences since the 6th General Assembly, fo-

cused on guidelines and orientation for future work of ABCP. Moreover, he issued a number of statements on the most important issues of international peace and gave interviews to the media on this topical issue.

He also took an active part in peace promotion activities and events organized by both religious and non-religious organizations and movements, where the President clearly outlined the missions and objectives of ABCP. He also took an active part in the global conference of religious leaders held in Moscow, a meeting of the Presidium of the World Peace Council, the 6th Congress of the Afro-Asian People's Solidarity Organization held in Algeria and many other international fora.

Khambo Gaadan accomplished many noble deeds by directing the efforts and financial sources of the Mongolian Buddhists to the cause of peace and against war. He also published many research papers on issues of peace in the "Buddhists For Peace" magazine of ABCP.

Basing on the contribution and the effort of Khambo Kh. Gaadan to the noble cause of international peace, against war, unity and harmony, he was reelected as the President of ABCP at the 7th General Conference of ABCP held in Vientiane, Laos in 1986.

Noteworthy would be to recall ABCP President's speech at the 6th General Conference. He then had appealed to the Asian Buddhists "to make every effort to establish peace and justice, and promote compassion and harmony for the good of intensifying the peace movement of the Asian Buddhists, and forging closer collaboration among Buddhists organizations also organizations and individuals of other religions and faiths." Proceeding from this premise,

the ABCP President Kh. Gaadan redefined the goals and objectives of ABCP, which led to the growth of the efforts and initiative of the Asian Buddhists, and the contacts and relationship of temples, monasteries and the religion as a whole with the general public.

Within the framework of the 20th foundation anniversary of ABCP, the 8th General Conference was held in Ulaanbaatar in September 1990. This coincided with a period when democratic changes and transformations began in Mongolia and heralded the period of the end of the Cold War. At the General Conference, the ABCP President summed

up the historic lesson of the organization and at the same time, called on the member National Centers to continue with their comprehensive activities and defined the reform plans of the organization.

It must be noted that the late ABCP President and Khambo Kh. Gaadan was a prominent peace promoter, who made his personal contribution to turning ABCP a prestigious international organization, brought closer together collaboration among the member National Centers and directed the attention of the international Buddhists to the issue of global and regional peace and security.

Summary of a paper entitled "The peace efforts of President of ABCP, Khambo Kh. Gaadan" presented by ABCP Secretary General Da Lama Kh. Byambajav at a scholarly conference organized jointly by Gandan Tegchenling Monastery-Center of Mongolian Buddhists, Department of Philosophy and Theology of the Mongolian National University, Institute of Language and Literature of the Mongolian Academy of Sciences and the local council of Uvs Aimag's Sagil and Turgen Soums in commemoration of the birth centenary of Kharkhuugiin Gaadan at the Gandan Tegchenling Monastery in Ulaanbaatar on 23 June 2023.

ABCP Japan National Center is collaborating with the "Japan Religious Persons Council for Peace" and carrying out joint activities.

The Japan Religious Persons Council for Peace, the so-called "Nihon Shuuheikyou," conducted a "Prayer for Choosing Life through Fasting" on August 5, 2023, amid the escalating danger of nuclear weapon use. The event took place in front of the Atomic Bomb Memorial Tower in Hiroshima Peace Memorial Park, in collaboration with the Hiroshima YMCA. Representatives from various religions, including Jodoshinshu Buddhism, Nichiren Buddhism and Christianity offered prayers in their own tradition.

This fasting prayer marked the 40th anniversary since the

establishment of the "Religious NGO" in August 1983, when the NGO began offering prayers for the victims of atomic bombings, advocating for the abolition of nuclear weapons, and the enactment of laws to support survivors. Additionally, a panel exhibition on atomic bomb and humanity was held at the park, aiming to convey the message to the public about the absolute evil of war and nuclear weapons.

Mrs. Nobue Ogasawara, who was a victim of the atomic bombing when she was a first-year student in an elementary school at the age of six, shared her experiences as an A-bomb survivor. She introduced her father's memoir, published in "Burnt Like a Leaf", which de-

tailed his experience as a professional military man. She stated, "Publicly advocating and justifying 'nuclear deterrence' argument at the G7 Summit blatantly insults the Hibakushas, survivors, the affected areas, and the people of the Hiroshima prefecture. I have hopes in the enactment and dissemination of the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons," and called for a swift and immediate abolition of nuclear weapons.

More than 20 individuals from all parts of Japan, who had come to the gathering, raised banners with slogans "Pray for a nuclear-free 21st century!", "Prayers for Peace into a Wave of Actions" and "No Need for Military Force."

Indian National Center of ABCP and Its Activities

Indian National Center of ABCP was formed in New Delhi in 1974. It is one of the oldest national centers of ABCP and substantially contributed to the development of ABCP. It also hosted the 3rd GA of ABCP in 1974 in New Delhi. A national organizing committee was setup for the purpose under the chairmanship of Most Venerable Kushok Bakula Rinpoche, M.P. The 3rd General Assembly adopted the historic New Delhi Declaration, which many consider the Magna-Carta of ABCP.

The 3rd GA of ABCP was inaugurated by Mr. Fakhruddin Ali Ahmed, President of India, alongside a galaxy of venerated figures and luminaries from the Buddhist world like HH the 14th Dalai Lama, Venerable Nichidatsu Fujii of Japan, Khambo Lama of Mongolia Venerable Samagiin Gombojav, Khambo Lama of Soviet Union Venerable Jambaldori Gomboev, Ven. Jinnarathana Mahathero and Bhadant Anand Kausalvan both from India and Buddhist leaders from several other countries. Mrs. Indira Gandhi, Prime Minister of India, hosted a reception in honour of the delegates at her residence.

Besides holding the GA of ABCP in 1974, the Indian National Center was also entrusted with the activities of "Com-

mission on Panchsheel" by the ABCP headquarters. It organized several symposiums and related activities in different parts of India. But unfortunately, after the 10th General Assembly of ABCP held in Vientiane, Laos in 2002 due to financial constraints and some other factors, the ABCP was unable to carry on its activities with the same zeal and intensity, and for nearly 15 years it maintained a very low profile.

Then in 2017 India celebrated the birth centenary year of Most Venerable Kushok Bakula Rinpoche, one of the most celebrated Buddhist leaders of India.

The occasion began with a mega event in Leh, Ladakh, India which also proved to be a godsent opportunity for the ABCP as it was during this period that the idea of rejuvenating ABCP found a strong voice. Birth centenary of Bakula Rinpoche was also celebrated in Mongolia too where he was popularly known as Elchin-Bagshi or the 'Ambassador Teacher' and which was his last Karma-Bhoomi (land of action). A grand celebration was held in Ulaanbaatar on 25th April 2018 to mark his Birth centenary. Mr. Damdin Tsogtbaatar, Hon'ble Foreign Minister of Mongolia, Mrs. Sushma Swaraj,

Minister for External Affairs of India, Mr. Gombojav Zandanshatar, Chief Cabinet Secretary of Mongolia and Most Venerable Khambo Lama D. Choijamts paid glowing tributes to Bakula Rinpoche on his birth centenary which was marked with deep devotion and solemnity. The yearlong celebration culminated with a mega celebration in Leh, India on 19 May, 2018, which was attended among others by Honorable Shri Narendra Modi, the Prime Minister of India.

With support from the ABCP Headquarters, a meeting of the ABCP Executive Council was held on 22nd May 2017 in New Delhi after nearly 16 years which finally broke the ice. It was attended by Most Ven. Khambo Lama D. Choijamts, President, Dr. T. Bulgan, Secretary General and members from several National Centers. It was an important step and a landmark beginning in the rejuvenation of

ABCP.

Participating in the meeting Mr. Sonam Wangchuk Shakspo, Secretary, ABCP Indian National Center lamented that the ABCP which was once a shining example of the Buddhist peace movement, has lost its sheen and called for urgent measures to rejuvenate it. He also called upon the members to celebrate the Golden Jubilee of the organization in 2019 marking the 50 years of great achievements. All the delegates to the Executive Council meeting endorsed the idea and expressed full solidarity with the ABCP headquarters. They assured all possible assistance towards rejuvenation of ABCP. The ABCP Executive Council meeting was an important step and a landmark beginning in the revival of ABCP after a long silence which besides other important measures, also announced the holding of the 11th General Assembly of ABCP

which coincided with the 50th anniversary of ABCP.

Thus the 11th General Assembly of ABCP was held in Ulaanbaatar, Mongolia in 2019 which was a grand success. Most of the ABCP National Center's participated in it. His Excellency Mr. Kh. Battulga, President of Mongolia, was the Chief Guest on the occasion which was also attended by Her Excellency Ms. Inga Rhonda King, President of United Nation's ECOSOC, New York.

Our Activities:

In subsequent years, Indian National Center has fully participated in the activities of ABCP and organized various events. In association with the Ministry of Culture, Government of India, Indian National Center participated in the exposition of holy Buddha Relics in Mongolia in 2021 and subsequently in

the printing and free distribution of 10 Kanjur or Kangyur texts in 108 volumes in Mongolian language which consists of works in 108 volumes of the words spoken by the Buddha himself.

M. Sonam Wangchuk, Secretary, ABCP Indian National Center was also a part of an official delegation representing the Ministry of Culture, which visited the Russian republics with substantial Buddhist population. On 15 September 2021, a function was held at the DP Dhar Hall, Embassy of India, to launch a book on the 19th Kushok Bakula Rinpoche. The book had been published by the Embassy of India in Russian. Ambassador Varma released the book and he was joined by Shri Suresh Soni, Shri Shakti Sinha, Dr. Sachidanand Joshi, Dr. Aashish Bhave, Prof. Alikberov and Dr. Tatiana Shauyman (senior members of Russian Academy of Science), Indologists and other dignitaries. During the course of their visit, the delegation visited Moscow, St. Petersburg, Kalmykia, Tuva and Ulan Ude and Aginsky regions of the Buriat Republic and discussed issues of mutual concern. The visit has paved way for future cooperation with the Buddhists of Russia and I hope that our efforts in this direction would continue.

There are hundreds of Mongolian and Russian monks undergoing monastic education in monasteries across India. ABCP Indian National Center has embarked upon a scholarship scheme of "Bakula Rinpoche scholarship" Rs. 1000- per month for all such monks irrespective of age and other considerations. The scholarship amount is directly credited to their bank accounts which has been highly appreciated by the beneficiaries.

BUDDHA'S IMAGE ON ANCIENT CONSTRUCTION MATERIALS

An international scholarly conference "Buddhism and Archaeology" was held at the Gandan Tegchenling Monastery, the Center of Mongolian Buddhists on 6 November 2023. This was the second scholarly conference jointly co-organized by the Institute of Archaeology of the Mongolian Academy of Sciences and the Gandan Tegchenling Monastery.

More than 30 papers were presented at the conference by some 40 scholars and researchers from Mongolia, Russian Federation, People's Republic of China, Japan and the Republic of Korea.

An archaeological exhibition was also displayed for the public in the Battsagaan Temple of the Gandan Tegchenling Monastery.

Dr. N. Erdene-Ochir, Secre-

tary of the Institute of Archaeology, speaking about an ancient Buddhist temple discovered anew in Mongolia said "We carried out archaeological excavation at a historical site called 'Khar Tune Ord,' the ruins of Turgen or the original palace of Khereid Wang, along the banks of Tuul river in the area of Songino near Ulaanbaatar and carried out extended initial research. There we discovered the remains of an ancient Buddhist temple which was built around the sixteenth century. Every year in fall, we review the outcome of our joint research and organize a conference under the theme 'Buddhism and Archaeology.' Thanks to our archaeological excavation, we have been able to find ruins of Buddhist temples and monasteries, and related artefacts."

The conference gave the opportunity to learn about the registration, preservation, protection of Buddhist relics related to the history of ancient empires and states of the Mongols. The conference also made it possible to learn about the outcome of scientific research conducted by Mongolian and foreign scholars covering a broad research areas, such as archaeological and historical source materials, ancient writings, cultural heritage, their preservation and restoration, architectural structure, design, construction decorations and ornaments, and the last conference was not an exception either.

Historians and scientists believe that Buddhism spread and flourished in Mongolia during three different historical periods. Research papers presented

at the conference revealed that the first period of the spread of Buddhism was during the rule of the Huns or the Xiongnú Empire that existed on the territory of present-day Mongolian BCE 209 to CE 93. At present, there are no hard evidences to prove the above, however, it can be corroborated with the help of archaeological studies.

In recent years, Mongolian archaeologists have discovered ruins or Buddhist temples and monasteries in many different parts of the country. Excavation and research have been carried out at some of them, leading to massive new finds, shedding new light on the spread of Buddhism, its scale and scope, and ever new evidences, which had not been recorded in any written sources, according to Dr. G. Eregzen, the Director of the Institute of Archaeology.

A joint project "Core of Heritage and Culture," which is being jointly implemented by the Institute of Archaeology of the Mongolian Academy of Sciences and the Erdem Institute of Culture of the Gandan Tegchenling Monastery, with financial support of Golomt Bank of Mongolia, aims to subject monuments related to Buddhism, that are being found from the territory of Mongolia, to archaeological study, and draw conclusions after their thorough study.

Artefacts and objects that are found within the framework of the archaeological research and excavations, are kept at the Institute of Archaeology, which are transferred and handed over to the relevant museums, and as of today, the Institute has more than 200 thousand such archaeological finds, cultural and other objects.

An exhibition of artefacts and objects found as a result of archeological excavations in recent years were on public display at a

special exhibition. From among the rare excavated objects and artefacts on display, of particular interest are the objects excavated from the ruins of the main monastery built by Kharkhul Khan on the banks of Khanui River in Erdenemandal soum of Arkhangai province, which most likely could be a very ancient Buddhist monastery appertaining to a very early period in the history of Mongolia.

On display at the exhibition were some very ancient artefacts and objects found from the ruins of Shagjaa Buddhist Monastery built during the reign of Monkh Khan, the fourth Khan of the Great Mongol Empire (June 1,1251 to August 11,1259), Buddhist artefacts appertaining to the seventeenth century, as well as rare objects belonging to Mother Queen Dondogdulam, who was the wife of the Eighth Bogd Khan of Mongolia (She was born in the Year of Blue Dog or 1874 in the Khuvchiin Jonon Beis Banner of Setsen Khan aimag).

Archaeological artefacts and objects that were displayed at Gandan Tegchenling Monastery, the Mongolian National Center of ABCP, were the results of a joint project with the Archaeological Institute of the Academy of Sciences of Mongolia and they represented different periods of Buddhism in the country.


lai Lama. These historical events, brought to life through the meticulous curation of old archives, have garnered widespread popularity.

Buddhist Wildlife Trade Demand Reduction Initiative in Southeast Asia: Mongolia Project Progress

Ulaanbaatar, Mongolia: In the vast and serene landscapes of Mongolia, a profound initiative is quietly making waves against the illegal wildlife trade.

The "Buddhist Wildlife Trade Demand Reduction Initiative in Southeast Asia" is a groundbreaking collaboration led by the Association of Mongolian Buddhist Devotees, with the invaluable support of Deutsche Gesellschaft für Internationale Zusammenarbeit (GIZ GmbH). This transformative endeavor is not only reshaping the narrative but also fostering a harmonious connection between Buddhist teachings and conservation efforts.

The initiative was realized from 1 February 2022 to 4 December 2023. Under the able management of NABU International's collaboratin with the

Association of Mongolian Buddhist Devotees as the project implementer, this initiative is not merely a project, it's a spiritual journey led by eminent monks. Da lama of Gandan Tegchenling Monastery and ABCP Secretary General Kh. Byambajav, and the 30th Abbot Khambo Nomun Khan of Gandan Tegchenling Monastery, Geshe Lharampa D. Javzandorj are providing pivotal leadership.

Commencing with a survey that touched the lives of 4,000 citizens, the project unveiled a poignant truth—67% were unfamiliar with Buddha's teachings. The need for environmental education, rooted in Buddhist principles, became evident. 76% recognized the insignificance of wild animal products in human life, and a resounding 63% called for legal reinforcement.

Responding to the survey, the project organized training sessions on Karma, Interdependence, Compassion, Superstitions about the use of marmot organs, Reducing the hunting of Khuvsgul Lake white fish, Worshipping of Mountains and its importance in nature conservation and the Ecological importance of wildlife, reaching over 20,000 people across various platforms. These sessions were held at the Gandan Tegchenling Monastery, Buddhist University of Mongolia, and high schools, correctional facilities, care homes, and local communities in six provinces - Khuvsgul, Bulgan, Dornod, Khentii, Khovd, and Omno-Gobi.

The dissemination of video content through Ulaanbaatar-based channels and social media has been instrumental. Noteworthy is the exhibition "Let's refuse-II," attended by 3,000 individuals, and a "Travelling library" spreading Buddha's teachings and distributing

wildlife conservation literature in six provinces.

Engaging the younger generation, the initiative organized a "Let's save wildlife" drawing contest involving 210 children. The winners, recognized during a public event, received certificates, cash prizes, and gifts. Further, a magazine, in collaboration with the Asian Buddhists Conference for Peace, delves into karma, nature, and wildlife conservation.

The initiative achieved sucdisseminating free information and leveraging Ulaanbaatar city billboards, thanks to the backing of government support. The intellectual property "Lord Buddha" 55 series of films has been featured on local television stations and government websites. Lectures at the Horse Trainers' Association, featuring the participation of the 29th Abbot Khambo Nomun Khan and ABCP President Choijamts Demberel, and an appeal at their meeting emphasize wildlife conservation.

As this project progressed, it carried the promise of inspiring positive change. It helped nurture a profound understanding of the interdependence between Buddhist teachings and wildlife conservation, fostering a collective consciousness that will echo through the vast landscapes. In the heartland of Mongolia, a beacon of change is lit—one that guides us towards a harmonious coexistence with nature, in the spirit of Buddha's teachings.
